

## About US

Established in 1965, the Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre (JPBC) located on Jerusalem's Mount of Olives is a charitable, non-governmental, non-profit organization entrusted under the Anglican Episcopal Church within the Diocese of Jerusalem. JPBC envisions for all Palestinian children with disabilities (CWD) to have increased access to quality health services and inclusive education, to be able to participate and have influence, hope and equal opportunities. Therefore, JPBC works on the integration and empowerment of CWD's and their families in their communities through their physical rehabilitation, inclusive education, the development and dissemination of best practices, and influencing policy and legislation.

JPBC is a member of the East Jerusalem Hospitals Network (EJHN) and one of the big four national rehabilitation centers in Palestine. JPBC is the main national referral centre for children with disabilities by the Palestinian Ministry of Health, for Comprehensive Rehabilitation Services.

In 2018, the Child Rehabilitation Centre passed successfully the second audit of the Joint Commission for International Accreditation (JCIA); maintaining its record of a high standard of quality service provision in the field of rehabilitation.

## 2019 Facts and Figures

### GENERAL FIGURES:

- Beneficiaries: the total number of beneficiaries who received any kind of service at the JPBC for the year 2019 was 2608.

### Child Rehabilitation Centre:

- Total number of children with disabilities who received rehabilitation services during 2019 was 1314 from East Jerusalem, West Bank and Gaza, detailed as following:
- 810 children from East Jerusalem received therapies through the Child Development Services.
- 417 children with disabilities from the West Bank and Gaza received therapies in the Child Rehabilitation Centre.
- 87 children from JPBC Inclusive School received rehabilitation services at the Child Rehabilitation Centre.
- 725 children with disabilities received assessment at JPBC clinic.
- 569 Children who received assessment at the intermediate centres in the community.

**Mother's Empowerment:** 417 mothers of children with disabilities from the West Bank and Gaza participated in the Mother's Empowerment Program.

### Inclusive School:

- 454 children were enrolled in the Jerusalem Princess Basma Inclusive School; 173 of them are with disabilities, constituting a percentage of 38% of the total number of students. 87 students with disabilities of the school received rehabilitation services at the Child Rehabilitation Centre.

### Clinical Training Program:

- 42 students from Palestinian Universities were enrolled in the clinical training program in the fields of physiotherapy, occupational therapy and special education.

### Vocational Training Program:

- 22 adult persons with disabilities received vocational training at the Sheltered Workshop.

## Child Rehabilitation Centre

A total number of 1,314 children from East Jerusalem West Bank and Gaza including 87 students from our inclusive school, received therapy services that included: physiotherapy, hydrotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, and psychosocial support. Children from West Bank and Gaza were referred for treatment by the PMoH<sup>1</sup>, PMMS<sup>2</sup> and UNRWA<sup>3</sup>, and children from East Jerusalem were referred for treatment by Medical Patient Funds<sup>4</sup>, or received treatment privately.

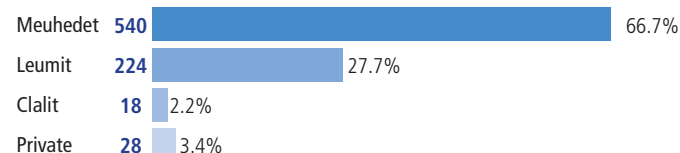
Figure 1: Type of Referral – West Bank / Gaza

A total number of 14,063 therapy sessions were provided to all children referred from the West Bank and Gaza during 2019 segregated as follow:

3,670 Speech and communication Therapy sessions



1,312 Music and Play Therapy sessions



3,578 Occupational Therapy sessions



1,690 Psychosocial support sessions.

## Outreach Program

In 2019, the total number of children with disabilities who received assessment through the outreach visits and clinics was 1,294, which was done through 60 outreach visits and 116 doctor clinics reaching different Palestinian cities and villages in all the West Bank and East Jerusalem.

## Type of disability

The JPBC works with children with all kinds of disabilities with focus on children with Cerebral Palsy, Neuromuscular Diseases, Pediatric Limb Deficiencies, Congenital Malformations, Post Musculoskeletal Traumas, Neurodevelopmental Disorders and Communicative Disorders (Autism Spectrum Disorder ASD and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder ADHD).

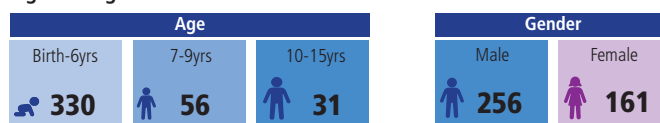

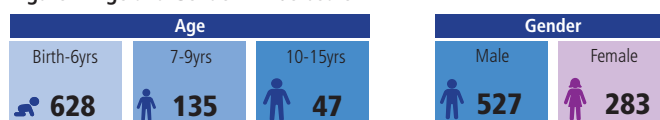
## Age and Gender of children

**Figure 3: Age and Gender – West Bank and Gaza**



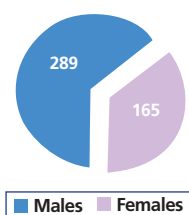
**Figure 4: Age and Gender – E. Jerusalem**



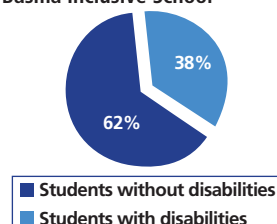
## Inclusive Education Program "The Jerusalem Princess Basma Inclusive School"

The total number of children who were enrolled in Princess Basma School for the academic year 2019/ 2020 was 454 children from kindergarten to 12th grade. 289 were males and 165 females, while the number of children with disabilities was 173 as detailed in table 5 below.

## Vocational Training Program "Sheltered Workshop"

The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre operates the Vocational Sheltered Workshop which embraces 22 adults with disabilities, of which 9 females and 13 were males. The workshop works as an avenue that provides a vocational training program in a safe environment for adult persons with disabilities from the Jerusalem area and its surroundings. The trainees gradually become more independent and integrated into the community.

In 2019, the sheltered workshop produced 1362 items of décor and home furniture and participated in 7 exhibitions throughout the year to promote the program.
