

## About US

The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre (JPBC) is a charitable, non-governmental, non-profit institution that operates under the umbrella of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and the Middle East. The JPBC was established in 1965, works on the integration and empowerment of children with disabilities and their families in their communities through: their physical rehabilitation, inclusive education, the development and dissemination of best practices, and influencing policy and legislation.

JPBC reached a new milestone in its accomplishments by receiving accreditation from the Joint Commission International (JCI) for Ambulatory Care. The accreditation certifies that the JPBC provides a high quality standard of service provision to its patients receiving rehabilitation services.

## What we do

We work on the inclusion of children with disabilities through medical rehabilitation and education. Our work is guided by the fundamental values expressed in the UN Conventions on the Rights of the Child and the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

## Our Staff

Each of our devoted 131 employees has a vested interest in the success of our Centre, as we are deeply committed to ensure the well-being of our children. Every team member has a stake in our services and programs and the relationships we have with our patients, residents, family members and health care partners.

## Engagement with partners

The JPBC is an active member of the East Jerusalem Hospital Network (EJHN) and acts as a resource for capacity building and dissemination of knowledge and best practices to partner organizations in the different Palestinian cities and villages.

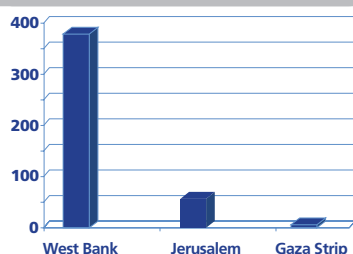
## 2017 Facts and Figures

### General figures:

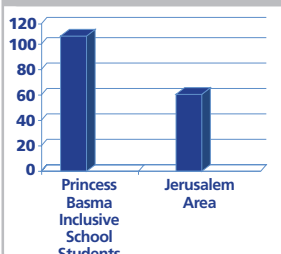
**Beneficiaries:** the total number of beneficiary cases who received any kind of service at the JPBC for the year 2017 was 2487 cases.

- Child Rehabilitation Centre:** 667 cases of children with disabilities received rehabilitation therapy services from Jerusalem, West Bank and Gaza Strip.
- Mother Empowerment:** 490 mothers of children with disabilities participated in the mother's empowerment program from West Bank and the Gaza Strip.
- Princess Basma Centre's Clinic:** 103 children with disabilities received assessment at the Princess Basma Centre Clinic.
- Adult Physiotherapy Clinic:** 708 adult persons received physiotherapy and hydrotherapy sessions until the end of October 2017.
- Inclusive Education:** 416 Children were enrolled at Princess Basma Inclusive School 161 of them are children with disabilities, a percentage of 38.70%. 112 students with disabilities of the school received rehabilitation services at the Rehabilitation Centre.
- Vocational Training Program:** 24 adult persons with disabilities received vocational training at the Sheltered Workshop.
- Clinical Training Program:** 16 Students from Palestinian Universities were enrolled in the clinical training program.

## Child Rehabilitation Inpatient Program

Total number of children referred for the comprehensive rehabilitation program which includes physiotherapy, hydrotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, psychosocial sessions, recreational activities is 490. The referral is done through the PMoH<sup>1</sup> PMMS<sup>2</sup> and UNRWA<sup>3</sup>.

## Outreach Program: 1,343 children were diagnosed throughout the JPBC outreach program and clinics

In 2017, the total number of children who were diagnosed throughout the Outreach Visits and clinics is 1,343 which were done through 60 visits reaching different Palestinian cities (Hebron, Jericho, Ramallah, Qalqiliyah, Tulkarem, Jenin, Nablus and surrounding towns of Jerusalem). As a result 490 children with disabilities were admitted for the comprehensive rehabilitation program at JPBC as detailed in tables Number 2 and 3 below.

## Type of disability

The JPBC works with children with all kinds of disabilities with focus on children with Cerebral Palsy, Neuromuscular Diseases, Pediatric Limb Deficiencies, Congenital Malformations, Post Musculoskeletal Traumas, Neurodevelopmental Disorders and Communicative Disorders (Autism Spectrum Disorder ASD and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder ADHD).

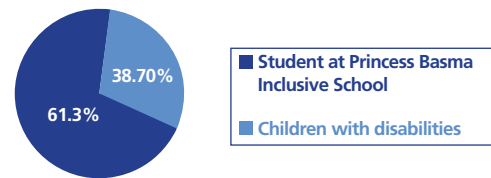

## Inclusive Education Program

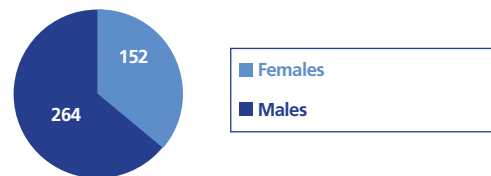
The total number of children who enrolled at the Princess Basma Inclusive School for the academic year of 2017/2018 was 416 children from kindergarten to 12th grade, of which 264 males and 152 females, while the number of children with disabilities is 161 as detailed in table 7.

112 children with disabilities at the school received rehabilitation services and psychosocial support.

## Vocational Training Program "Sheltered Workshop"

The Princess Basma Centre operates the Sheltered Workshop which embraces 24 adults with disabilities, of which 14 females and 10 males. The workshop works as an avenue that provides a vocational training program in a safe environment for adult persons with disabilities from the Jerusalem area and its surroundings. The trainees gradually become more independent and integrated in the community.
